
New Business

Nancy has a BS in Industrial Arts Education from the State University College at Buffalo where she explored many creative mediums, including drawing, painting, graphic design, woodworking, metals, and plastic. She has a minor in architectural drafting and design.

After teaching for 2 years, her position was eliminated and she took a job with IBM that spanned 35 years. During her career, she traveled to over 50 different countries allowing her to explore cultures,

He shared his approach to paintings using subject matter in a less photographic way. He utilizes "design" in his work. Despite a few technical issues the presentation was well received and his work is amazing.


Some of the artists were awed by Dan's management of snow in his pieces.








Scottsdale Artists League

Few of you may know that as members of SAL you are part of one the oldest Artists Leagues in the Phoenix area......

In the July issue you learned about the foundation of SAL. More than 60 years It is quite impossible to review all the unique events have passed. that happened since then, but one important one is vivid in the minds of many members still part of SAL The creation of Scottsdale Artists It happened in 1983 about twenty years after the foundation of SAL . A small group of Arizona artists decided to create a place of inspiration. A place where any new artist regardless of the skill level could learn from the best working artists in the country. Scottsdale Artists was one of the major group to promote this idea and provided part of the financial support needed to make it take off. Scottsdale Artists School started with just one very small studio. The initiative received a lot of approval from students who solicited civic A decade with success. later the school and support grew historic Loloma Elementary School in the heart of moved into the (Small picture below) . The Loloma school was Scottsdale Art' District. small at that time but the building was located where Scottsdale Artists School is located today. Rules for Artist of the Month Contest



All artists who enter must have attended 3 General Meetings within the calendar year

One cannot take artwork from Critique and enter the piece into the show at the same meeting. A later meeting is fine.

- Dues cannot be outstanding.
- Paintings must be framed or Gallery-wrapped((at least 1 1/2" wide) and painted on all sides.
- If you win a 1st Place ribbon you cannot enter again until the next year.
- Artwork must be original, no "copies of the Old Master" or other works permitted.
- No wet paintings.

Sign in at the table, fill out a slip with TITLE and MEDIUM of the painting and the number assigned to you Display your work on the white clothed chairs in front of the stage with Title and number slip in front of your artwork.

Members who attended the General Meeting vote and a 1st, 2nd and 3rd Place ribbons will be awarded.

At the December meeting all 1st place winners will enter their artwork in the "Artist of the Year" contest.

An award will be given to the winner. Should you have sold the winning work, then please submit a similar painting for the December meeting. This contest will be judged by a committee selected by the Board and not the general membership.

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








Westminster Village Show



Here is an opportunity for members, friends (65 plus) and people with disabilities that live in participating communities.

RideChoice will provide access to local transportation providers like local taxicabs, rideshare, companies like Uber Lyft and other companies with wheelchair accessible vehicles.

RideChoice is available 24-7 including holidays.

RideChoice®

RideChoice provides alternative travel options for ADA paratransit certified people with disabilities and seniors age 65 and above who reside in participating communities.

When using RideChoice, you will get access to a network of transportation providers such as local taxicabs, rideshare companies like Uber or Lyft and other local companies with wheelchair-accessible vehicles.

- Once you're eligible, call 602.716.2111 for all your RideChoice needs.
 The RideChoice is available 24 hours per day, every day of the year, including holidays.
- Request your ride when you want to travel; there's no requirement to book ahead.
- RideChoice costs \$3 for each one-way trip up to eight miles, with additional miles costing \$2 per mile.
- Take up to 20 trips per month! If you need to take longer trips, or if you need to use RideChoice for more frequent trips to work, school or medical appointments, we have additional program options that may be right for you. Please contact us at 602.716.2100, RideChoice option, to discuss these options.
- Go straight to your destination. You do not have to share your ride.
- If you need wheelchair-accessible service, just ask. There is no additional charge.

To apply for Valley Metro RideChoice service, please call 602.716.2100.

Approximately two weeks after enrolling in the RideChoice program, you will receive a welcome letter. It includes instructions for using RideChoice. Using RideChoice is Easy as 1, 2, 3

STEP 1-CALL RIDECHOICE AT 602.716.2111

Be ready to provide your pick-up and drop-off addresses, the date and time you wish to travel and the transportation provider you wish to use for the trip. Providers include rideshare companies, several local taxicab companies and other companies who provide wheelchair-accessible service.

STEP 2-PAY YOUR FARE

RideChoice costs \$3 for each one-way trip up to eight miles. After the eighth mile, you will be charged an additional \$2 per mile. When you book your trip, the RideChoice Customer Service Representative will advise you of the approximate length of your trip and the amount that you will be charged on the day of your scheduled trip. Fares may be paid by credit or debit card, checking account, or E-wallet. Charges are not finalized until trip is completed.

STEP 3-ENJOY YOUR TRIP

Be ready to board when the vehicle arrives. Your RideChoice driver is not required to wait more than five minutes for you to board, so be ready.
