Brief discussion ensued with several members sharing their experiences and opinions about the ad. Donna came away with a lighter feeling about the expense thanks to members' input.

John Fontana: Arizona Art Alliance

Update on the Gratitude Project. 800 canvases had been ordered and than 700 donated pieces returned. Each piece will be in Arizona Art Alliance's more Instagram page with Artist contact information. Coming up is Hospice of the Valley, Mayo Clinic (about 5 month display) and ASU, Honor Health. After the shows are taken down the pieces are offered to healthcare workers as a donation. John suggested artists consider adding some personal information on the back so if workers are interested in their art. contact information is available to them. The VA display is a permanent one. The project is looking for more floral pieces to be donated and John said he'd have more 6x6 inch panels at the next meeting after a hearty show of hands expressing interest in contributing more. Discussion

SCHOLARSHIP CHAIR: Diane Scholar needs to step down as chair. Linda Phillips (former chair) found teachers not eager to promote students due to COVID overload. There were also issues with online vs in person learning and the involvement with student portfolios. We need someone to head this up and Linda will likely be helpful during the initial phase of the new chair position. We work with the public schools in the Scottsdale Unified School District (SUSD) offering graduating seniors the opportunity to apply for \$1,000 scholarship grants toward college art studies. At the meeting a member raised a question as to why we haven't worked with charter schools. No satisfactory answer was offered. This appears to be something for consideration.

Perhaps our new chairperson could find those answers.

Marti Thorson, our recording secretary has to step away from her position for medical reasons. The responsibilities are simply to take notes from two meetings each month and create a report. The general meeting is the 1st Tuesday of every month and the board meeting is the 4th Tuesday via Zoom. It is a simple but vital task and required by the Corporation Commission and in our by laws.

This Exhibition will be on for one full year till next Anniversary. A parade on Historic Route 66 has been held on Saturday 13 in the morning and a Pow Wow in the evening at Gallup Red Rock Park. Below are few photos taken of the "Danza de Voladores" ritual. Five participants dance first and then climb a pole 98ft and 5in high. After having arranged the ropes, four of the five participants then launch themselves tied with ropes to descend to the ground. The fifth remains on top of the pole, dancing and playing a flute and drum. According to one myth, the ritual was created to ask the gods to end a drought. Whatever the myth says, it is a great demonstration of courage.

A legacy of Art Knowledge, Creativity and Chance to Meet Others

Few of you may know that as members of SAL you are part of one the oldest Artists Leagues in the Phoenix area......

In the last two issues you have been told about the birth of SAL and how it contributed to the foundation off SAS and AzAA. This issue will tell you how SAL grew up to become one of the most well regarded art leagues.

Late in the 1960's, just few years after its foundation, SAL hosted more than 500 members and sponsored a variety of creative activities for every artist at every progressive level, juried and not juried shows, life-drawing workshops, guest speaker and critiques, travel opportunities and community exchanges, all designed to encourage artists to enrich their own creativity while contributing to the aesthetic environment of the community. This has been very much appreciated by the community and recognized by the media.

Scottsdale Art League Annual Opens



'Mayer With Snow' By Bernice Jones

The Scottsdale Art League's Sixth Annual Open (to Arizona artists, that is) Exhibit opened yesterday in Scottsdale (western side of Fashion Square, Camelback and Scottsdale Road).

Among the more attractive and/or attention holding works are Berenice Jones' water-color, "Mayer With Snow," a vigorous, brushy (dry) picture on rough paper. The limitations of color the painter put on herself have added to, rather than taken away from, the strength of the piece: it is mainly ochers, umbers, and a few strokes of earth red.

"West Texas Landscape" by Henry von Roessler is partly illustration, partly surrealism, with a strong yellow ground adding to the second effect, but with the crisp linear quality contributing to the first. It is a work one cannot miss, surely.

THE GENUINE article surrealism is exemplified by Jon Hopins' "Two Lovers Lost in Monet's Garden." Except for the low value key, this is something of the sort of thing one used to see from the brush of Salvador Dali, and almost as technically careful, too, speaking, perhaps, of the mahl stick, certainly of small pointed brushes.

The title of Carol Colburn's sturdy, b o l d, black - outlined still life is "Hello! Mr.

Braque." Surely the painter does herself an injustice; there is little of Braque, a great deal of Colburn. Even the colors are more vigorous, not muted like Braque's.

In polymer, Mary Sherman's "Built on a Hill" is a quiet, but well constructed landscape with houses, deftly and professionally "messy." A work that one might pass by, it will not be by the knowledgeable.

EVEN SMALLER, Judy Denson's watercolor, "Figure Study" is delicately drawn and handled loosely, in quiet colors also.

Quite the opposite is Robert Oliver's "San Miguel," one of those bold, almost swashbuckling watercolors on the roughest of handmade paper, done crisply, dryly, and with the largest of brushes. The technique may be a little old fashioned, but who cares?

Two colored tissue collages that make interesting contrasts are Jean Collet's large "Boy on Bicycle" and her much smaller "Chess Players." The first will catch the eye with its almost discordant hues — running to greens — its slightly off balance, careless design, general bold lack of caution.

The second work, on the other hand is carefully designed, but so quietly colored, albeit in warms — mainly reds — that one might pass it by if he were not alert.

Another of those "murky" watercolors, confidently careless, but in too low a key to call much attention to itself, is Jean Marie Price's "Clouds on the Mountain."

"CROUCHING NUDE" by Bobi Simons is a calligraphically brave effort in brush and ink, and one of the few drawings.

"Dream Images" by Beth Ames Swartz is one of the best nonobjective works and shows a sensitivity for the use of space.

Ruth Magadini's "Desert Green" has mood but piles up more mass in the center than it can handle efficiently.

Frances Cole's watercolor, "Panorama," has all the technical definess that one has come to expect from this Valley painter; still the piece is not as resolved, somehow, as many of her other pictures.

The show may be seen through Feb. 11.

Rules for Artist of the Month Contest



All artists who enter must have attended 3 General Meetings within the calendar year

One cannot take artwork from Critique and enter the piece into the show at the same meeting. A later meeting is fine.

- Dues cannot be outstanding.
- Paintings must be framed or Gallery-wrapped((at least 1 1/2" wide) and painted on all sides.
- If you win a 1st Place ribbon you cannot enter again until the next year.
- Artwork must be original, no "copies of the Old Master" or other works permitted.
- No wet paintings.

Sign in at the table, fill out a slip with TITLE and MEDIUM of the painting and the number assigned to you Display your work on the white clothed chairs in front of the stage with Title and number slip in front of your artwork.

Members who attended the General Meeting vote and a 1st, 2nd and 3rd Place ribbons will be awarded.

At the December meeting all 1st place winners will enter their artwork in the "Artist of the Year" contest.

An award will be given to the winner. Should you have sold the winning work, then please submit a similar painting for the December meeting. This contest will be judged by a committee selected by the Board and not the general membership.
































Westminster Village Show
























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TIPS

Tips for Oil Painters - by Marsha Lazar Klinger)

Here is a way to recycle your odorless turpentine. Use an empty clean glass jar and pour your turpentine into the glass jar. Be sure to tag the lid as Recycled Turp. At the bottom of your turp can will be all the pigments you cleaned out of your brush. Take paper towels and, I use an old chop stick, to swish the paper towel around until I got most of the pigment out of the bottom. Then I use a little turp to rinse all the pigment out. Refill your brush turp can with new odorless turpentine. The recycled turp in the jar will be ready to fill your turp can the next time you need new turpentine. The pigment in the jar will sink to the bottom of the jar and leave you with clean turp. I usually just throw the jar away and start the old, dirty turp with a new jar.








City of Tempe Public Art Program: Bicycle Lockers



Reading page 6 you understood that I went to Gallup to take photos of Shannon O'Donnell's exhibition at the Indian Cultural Center. It has been a good opportunity to catch two pigeons with one seed and go to take photos of "Bisti//De-Na-Zin" wilderness area too, just south east of Farmington, NM. It was a long time I wanted to visit this unique area. One of the most interesting in the south west for the bizarre rock formations. Indeed, Bisti/De-Na-Zin includes some of the most unique rock formations in this planet. "Bisti" is a Navaho word meaning sandhill and De-Na-Zin means "standing cranes." Petroglyphs rock art of cranes have been found south of this wilderness. Like in any wilderness area I had to walk quite a lot to reach what I wanted to take photos of. Very strenuous but very rewarding at the end. Here is a photo of one iconic rocks formation. I am sure you will agree with me. It is unique and bizarre. It is named the "Three Wings". The millennial erosion of water, (the area has been under the sea for millions of years) and later the wind has shaped these rocks like perfect wings. Like the wings of a manta ray fish or even alien space ships you may have seen in one of the many popular Sci-Fi movies.
