So, I divided the painting into four sections and each guarter symbolize the four seasons. Therefore, taming the boldness of the sea of black and relaying that the hoop dance is about nature. Only the next show will prove me successful or not. Do you have a painting that no one understands? Then expand your message to help the viewer relate. Make your painting tell the story or be on hand to explain your vision. Paintings need to be beautiful and tell a story..

Donna shared the Chase contact she spoke with posited that things might be happening at the Postal Worker level. Marsha Lazar - Klinger shared a check order of hers was stolen and she had to change all her accounts because of this. Looks like we all need to be on alert.

At Sweetwaters Leslie Austin sold a painting which brings the number of pieces sold to 9. Members asked about the payment process. Marsha said David (owner), his son Elliott or daughter - in - law Nicole are always present. They take the check, put it in the safe and the buyer takes the painting with them. David contacts Marsha and/or Donna that the check is in the safe for pick up. If it's a credit card purchase, David gets the information and Donna contacts the buyer for a Square transaction after which the painting is released.



John Fontana: Arizona Art Alliance

John Fontana: Update on the Gratitude Project. 800 canvases had been ordered and more than 700 donated pieces returned. Each piece will be in Arizona Art Alliance's Instagram page with Artist contact information. Coming up is Hospice of the Valley, Mayo Clinic (about 5 month display) and ASU, Honor Health. After the shows are taken down the pieces are offered to healthcare workers as a donation. John suggested artists consider adding some personal information on the back so if workers are interested in their art. contact information is available to them. The VA display is a permanent one. The project is looking for more floral pieces to be donated and John had several 6x6 inch panels at the meeting for members to take with them. We need a new SCHOLARSHIP CHAIR

Diane Scholar needs to step down as chair. Linda Phillips (former chair) found teachers not eager to promote students due to COVID overload.

There were also issues with online vs in person learning and the involvement with student portfolios. We need someone to head this up and Linda will likely be helpful during the initial phase of the new chair position.

We work with the public schools in the Scottsdale Unified School District (SUSD) offering graduating seniors the opportunity to apply for \$1,000 scholarship grants toward college art studies. Perhaps this new school year with provide more comprehensive results.

Recording Secretary

Marti Thorson, our recording secretary has to step away from her position for medical reasons. The responsibilities are simply to take notes from two meetings each month and create a report. He has taken classes with Diane Maxie and Dick Phillips and has painted with artists such as Robert E. Wood and Milford Zornes. John now teaches painting and sketching at the Shemer Art Center in Phoenix. John Erwin has exhibited his paintings in many group shows including The Shemer Art Community Center, Phoenix University Club, Center. The Fountain Hills Foothills Community Center, and Scottsdale Artists' School. He has won many awards including a first place in watercolor at the Arizona State Fair. His sketches will soon be in an international exchange show with Scottsdale's sister city. Cairns Australia. John is a juried member of the Watercolor Arizona Artists' Guild. Arizona Association. and the Contemporary Watercolorists of Arizona. He helped found the critique group Pinnacle Peak Critiquers and is a member of the 22 X 30 Critique Group. It is a pleasure to introduce you to Karen Loftus





Few of you may know that as members of SAL you are part of one the oldest Artists Leagues in the Phoenix area......

The last three issues told you about the birth of SAL. How it contributed to the foundation of SAS and AzAA and how it grew up to be one of the leagues most active and respected art in Arizona. Since its birth thanks qood leadership and active members SAL has to continued the initial mission, keeping the tradition established more than 62 years ago.



-Artist of the Month Rules-



All artists who enter must have attended 3 General Meetings within the calendar year

One cannot take artwork from Critique and enter the piece into the show at the same meeting. A later meeting is fine.

- Dues cannot be outstanding.
- Paintings must be framed or Gallery-wrapped((at least 1 1/2" wide) and painted on all sides.
- If you win a 1st Place ribbon you cannot enter again until the next year.
- Artwork must be original, no "copies of the Old Master" or other works permitted.

- No wet paintings.

Sign in at the table, fill out a slip with TITLE and MEDIUM of the painting and the number assigned to you Display your work on the white clothed chairs in front of the stage with Title and number slip in front of your artwork.

Members who attended the General Meeting vote and a 1st, 2nd and 3rd Place ribbons will be awarded.

At the December meeting all 1st place winners will enter their artwork in the "Artist of the Year" contest.

An award will be given to the winner. Should you have sold the winning work, then please submit a similar painting for the December meeting. This contest will be judged by a committee selected by the Board and not the general membership.



























Westminster Village Show

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




















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Museum of Flight Exhibition





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

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Greetings,

You know I have been to the Museum of Flight in Seattle, WA. So let's talk about aircraft.

Who does not like airplanes? And if you like airplanes for sure you can not forget the Lockheed L-1049 Constellation. The aircraft was Lockheed development of the early L-749 Constellation (1943) ordered in secret in 1939 by Howard Hughes to launch TWA to offer passengers features not offered by any other commercial airline at that time (higher speed, cabin pressurization to fly above weather disturbances). The L-1049 was a follow up upgrade to compete in the early 50's with the Douglas DC-6B on the long range routes over the Atlantic and Pacific. The L-1049 started service in 1953 with many US airlines like Eastern, TWA and international airlines like Air France, KLM, Luthansa, Iberia, Qantas, Trans Canada Airlines and many more including military versions for the United States Air Force and Navy.

Connie, the nick name given to it was an aircraft of iconic design, very aerodynamic and extremely good looking. The one located at the main entrance of the Museum of Flight in Seattle is a Super G model, so named by TWA. It has been operated by Trans Canada Airlines.

The L-1049G version was fitted with wing tip tanks to increase the range over 5000 Mi.

It wasn't until the development of jet airliner's such as the De Havilland Comet, the Boeing 707 and the Douglas DC-8 that the Connie began to slip from popularity. Unable to compete with the speed and economics of jet engines, the world's first pressurized aircraft was rendered obsolete.

As said above, the Museum's Constellation was delivered to Trans-Canada Airlines in 1954 as a 1049C and was later converted to the 1049G standard. TCA's Connies were replaced by Douglas DC-8s by 1962. After a career flying passenger and later cargo with World Wide Airways, the aircraft retired from flying in 1965. It sat in derelict condition for many years in different locations in Quebec and Ontario, Canada. It was partially restored and made into a museum during this period. Later, it was converted into a hotel cocktail lounge and lunch delicatessen at the Toronto airport during 1996-2002.

The Museum eventually acquired the aircraft in 2005. Following extensive restoration to its original appearance in TCA colors in Rome, New York, it was trucked to the Museum's main campus in Seattle in 2009. I shot this photo in the evening after sunset.
