



My background ...

We've lived in the East Valley for 36 years, we currently live in Gold Canyon

- · Originally from Des Moines, Iowa
- I've been drawing since age 5 or so
- Attended Des Moines Technical High School
 - · It was a vocational school, with 3 hour art classes
 - Instruction in drawing, painting, calligraphy/lettering, photography · I was fortunate to win a national poster contest in my senior year
- · Worked in commercial art (advertising) for 5 years Mostly ad layout work for grocery distribution center
- Little creativity, so I completely changed industries I began painting with watercolors 20+ years ago
- · I got serious about my art about 10 years ago
- * There are many styles of painting ...

· I painted a tequila bottle in acrylics

· As a result, I got commissioned to paint

Everyone who saw them said, "You need to paint tequila bottles .. you're good at painting glass!"

· I love really good tequila so it's a win-win

· I really got into painting shiny things The bottles themselves are beautiful art – especially the labels, which often tell a story

- · I went back and tried again, and was able to get it




Originals and Giclée prints

-Artist of the Month Rules-



All artists who enter must have attended 3 General Meetings within the calendar year.

One cannot take artwork from Critique and enter the piece into the show at the same meeting. A later meeting is fine.

- Dues cannot be outstanding.

- Paintings must be framed or Gallery-wrapped((at least 1 1/2" wide) and painted on all sides.

- If you win a 1st Place ribbon you cannot enter again until the next year.

- Artwork must be original, no "copies of the Old Master" or other works permitted.

- No wet paintings.

Sign in at the table, fill out a slip with TITLE and MEDIUM of the painting and the number assigned to you Display your work on the white clothed chairs in front of the stage with Title and number slip in front of your artwork

For members who attended the General Meeting vote a 1st, 2nd and 3rd Place ribbons will be awarded.

General Meeting

Shannon O'Donnell President:

Shannon began the meeting with thank-you's to everyone for help in re-organizing the meetings.

NEW BUSINESS

It was agreed that the **SAL Board meetings** will focus on the business of SAL and the **General Meetings** will be more of a social gathering but; will still have the critique, show information, Artist of the Month (AOM), drawings and announcements. The meeting formats will be a work in progress and any suggestions for improvement are welcome. There will be a suggestion box available at all General Meetings or just contact Shannon with your ideas.

Shannon asked that members please vote on the AOM at the beginning of the meeting so that counting of the votes can be completed by 7:10 p.m. and awards presented immediately following the meeting. All submissions for AOM must be in by 6:45 p.m. (beginning of the meeting). Anyone wishing to participate that arrives late will be asked to please submit their work at the next meeting. Winning a place in the Artist of the Month is an honor that we need to recognize and give more prominence to as a group.

Shannon welcomed new members and guests and asked them to stand for recognition. Welcome!

A new addition to the meeting will be the "**Bragging Bench**": an area where previous AOM first-place winners, that cannot participate again in AOM in the current year, can still bring work they would like to share with the group.

Microphone issues are ongoing and Shannon has discussed the problem with the church. Apparently, the church is also having problems and is working on the issue.

Shannon explained the 50/50% raffle to the new members.

Shannon discussed a new membership software program that SAL is going to buy. This will streamline new memberships, renewals, lists of members, mailing addresses, etc. The program will be available for new members to join on line also.

There will be some changes to the **SAL newsletter**. When Franco Valentini returns from vacation, he will change the format of the letter to move information from Arizona Art Alliance (AAA) more to the beginning of the newsletter, before all of the pictures of the shows, and there will be links for more information provided.

The October Board meeting will be at Shannon's house.

Shannon also stated that the January General Meeting will have a fundraiser instead of a presenter. This will be an opportunity to donate unused art supplies and for members to be able to buy them, with the funds going to SAL.

SHOWS:

Barbarann Mainzer reported that the next change-out for **Westminster Village** is on October 16. The current show has 12 artists and 49 works of art. The reception was well attended.

Shannon reported the **Sweetwater Coffee & Tea** change-out will be September 21. The current show has 12 participants.

Pearson & Co. may have a few new changes, Shannon has spoken to the owner about the possibility of putting up some umbrellas to cover a very sunny area. There has been some discussion regarding selling prints, the number of artists participating, and whether or not the artists have to be at the show all the time. More to come on this.

Shelley Koenigs discussed the possibility of a new tent show where she works, Creative Leather, located on Indian School Road, between Miller and Hayden. They own their parking lot and have agreed to allow SAL to set up a tent show/sidewalk sale, no date has been decided but, a Saturday would be best. There is good traffic flow, they have bathroom facilities, there is a possibility of food trucks and Creative Leather would do advertising. There was member-interest expressed in pursuing this event. More information will be on the Web site or please contact Shelley.

Shannon is still trying to connect with the Desert Botanical Garden.




September is national suicide awareness prevention month.

Request for Qualifications (RFQ) — Scottsdale Public Art

Entry deadline: Monday, Sept. 25, 2023 (11:59 p.m. MST (AZ)

Scottsdale Public Art is accepting qualifications from artists for two temporary public art opportunities located in Scottsdale, Arizona. Both opportunities are for a new 3D sculptural installation on an outdoor concrete plinth. The first plinth is located on the northeast corner of Scottsdale Road and Oak Street. The second plinth is located on the northeast corner of Scottsdale Road and Roosevelt Street. The size of the concrete mounting surface on the plinths is 40" x 40". The theming of the artwork is open. Each project has a separate budget of \$8,750.

Up to two artists/artist teams will be selected. Each selected artist will design, fabricate, and install a new temporary art installation at their designated site. The artworks will be on display for one year, with the artworks returning to the artists after the display period.

Artists living and working in Maricopa County in the state of Arizona, United States, who have less than two years of experience designing, fabricating, and installing projects with a similar budget and scope, are encouraged to apply. click here for more information

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT TIP OF THE MONTH

It's show season! So often I hear from artists how overwhelming this time of year can be. Here is a list of suggestions to help you navigate the myriad of show opportunities coming up this season.

Make a list of the CALLS FOR ART that have appeal to you. (Don't forget to add AzAA shows!!). Include entry deadlines and show dates. This will help you decide which art pieces you want to enter in each show and help you manage your time.

Carefully read the entry guidelines and requirements provided by the art show organizers.

Make sure you understand the submission deadlines, entry fees, and any specific instructions.

Choose the pieces you want to submit for the show. Consider the theme, size, and medium of your artwork in relation to the show's theme or requirements.

Treat virtual/online shows as though they are in person so that you are not showing the same work in multiple shows online simultaneously.

Create an inventory list that includes the title, medium, dimensions, and price of each artwork. Take high-quality photographs of your artwork for digital submissions.

If submitting digitally, make sure your image files meet the specified format and resolution requirements. Label your image files with clear titles and your name.

Ensure your artwork is clean, in good condition, and properly framed or mounted.

Attach labels with your name, contact information, and the artwork's title to the back of each piece.

Fill out the entry form provided by the organizers accurately.

Pay any entry fees, and keep a record of payment.

Write an artist statement that explains your work, its meaning, and your creative process.

Create a brief artist biography highlighting your background, experience, and artistic journey.

Prepare promotional materials like business cards or postcards to distribute at the art show, if allowed. Make arrangements to deliver and pick up your work on the designated dates.

Prepare to engage with attendees, answer questions about your work, and network with fellow artists. Remember to enjoy the art show experience and connect with fellow artists and art enthusiasts.

Distribute the show's marketing materials. This may include social media posts/reposts, mail or distributing postcards to neighboring businesses.

Send out invitations for the opening reception and distribute press releases to local media outlets. Invite art critics, curators, and potential buyers.

Consider hosting gallery talks or workshops, if appropriate, during the exhibit to engage with visitors and share insights into your artistic process.

After the exhibit, follow up with attendees, thank them for their support, and provide information on how to purchase your artwork if they couldn't attend the opening.
